Thunder Bay Sanctuary Advisory Council Working Group's Boundary Evaluation Document Recommending Expansion of Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary to Include Alpena, Alcona, and Presque Isle counties, East to the International Border with Canada.

A resolution was passed by the advisory council on May 22, 2007 recommending expansion of the sanctuary to the working group's recommended area.

Background

In 1997, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) proposed to the State of Michigan, the Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary (NMS) to include an approximately 808-square-mile area extending from Presque Isle Lighthouse in Presque Isle County south to Sturgeon Point Lighthouse in Alcona County, east to West 83 degrees longitude. This area was proposed based on the national significance of the area's collection of maritime heritage resources, primarily shipwrecks. Well preserved by Lake Huron's cold, fresh water, the Thunder Bay region contains scores of shipwrecks that span a century and a half of Great Lakes maritime history. From early wooden sailing vessels to modern steel-hulled freighters, these archaeological sites reflect transitions in ship architecture and construction methods. These unique historic sites serve as a dramatic link to the region's broader maritime landscape, helping to illuminate the critical role of the Great Lakes and Great Lakes people in American history. The large array of shipwrecks in the Thunder Bay region includes virtually all types of vessels used on the Great Lakes. Thunder Bay's collection of shipwrecks represents a broad history of Great Lakes culture and commerce and is considered historically nationally significant.

In response to concerns expressed during designation, NOAA agreed to reduce the size of the proposed sanctuary to approximately 448 square miles. The revised boundary extended to the West 83 degrees longitude as the lakeward boundary, but used the Alpena County lines as the north and south boundaries. Based on the historical, archaeological, recreational, and interpretive value of the area's nationally significant collection of maritime heritage resources, this area was designated the Thunder Bay NMS and Underwater Preserve on October 7, 2000, and is jointly managed by the State of Michigan and NOAA. NOAA agreed to adopt the 448-square-mile boundary with the stipulation that, after five years, an inventory of shipwrecks would be evaluated to determine if boundary expansion is warranted.

NOAA re-proposed the sanctuary to the Governor in 2005, and that same year, the sanctuary became permanent. During the process, there was an opportunity for the public to comment on how the sanctuary was being managed. Public comments were also sought during the 2006 scoping process for management plan review. As a result, NOAA received a number of comments expressing interest in boundary expansion to include Alcona and Presque Isle Counties. Several local government and non-governmental organizations including the City of Alpena, Alpena County, Alpena Township, Sanborn Township, Presque Isle Township, Rogers City, Alcona County, Michigan Sunrise Side Travel Association, and the Sunrise Side Coastal Highway Management Council passed resolutions or submitted written letters of support for expansion. Based on public interest, boundary expansion was identified as a priority issue for management plan review. A boundary expansion working group was developed to determine whether the boundaries should be expanded to protect, manage, and

interpret additional shipwrecks and other potential maritime heritage resources, and to make a recommendation to the sanctuary advisory council. This group met before other management plan review working groups so that those groups could consider a larger boundary when making recommendations.

Benefits of Inclusion in the Sanctuary

Expanding the sanctuary boundary to include more shipwrecks will provide additional protection to those wrecks than that already provided by Michigan State law. Designation as a national marine sanctuary may also provide increased resources for research and long-term monitoring, education, and enforcement necessary to fully know, understand, and protect the resources. Designation as a sanctuary draws attention to the fact that the resources have national significance and this status may provide additional opportunities for tourism and economic growth.

The Study Area

The boundary expansion working group identified and considered the following study area for evaluation of boundary alternatives: a 3,662-square-mile area extending from Alcona County to Presque Isle County, east to the international border with Canada. The study area was identified based on the density of known and undiscovered resources, the historical, archaeological, and recreational significance of individual and collective resources, and the maritime landscape.

Boundary Evaluation and Recommendation

The boundary expansion working group evaluated three alternatives in the study area:

- A) No expansion (448 square miles)
- B) Presque Isle Lighthouse in Presque Isle County south to Sturgeon Point Lighthouse in Alcona County, east to West 83 degrees longitude (808 square miles)
- C) The entire study area (3,662 square miles)

The group considered a larger alternative – all waters off Alpena, Alcona, and Presque Isle Counties plus Spectacle Reef – but excluded it because interest expressed by the public and local governments was limited to expansion to Presque Isle, Alpena, and Alcona Counties. The group also discussed expanding to Presque Isle and Alcona Counties east to the West 83 degrees longitude, but excluded it due to the potential for well preserved, undiscovered wrecks in deeper waters to the east.

Appendix A displays tables of known shipwrecks (shipwrecks with available coordinates) and undiscovered shipwrecks (shipwrecks that may be located in this area of Lake Huron) in the boundary alternatives. A summary of the results of the tables is shown below.

^{*}Approximate locations of undiscovered shipwrecks are based upon historic records. The list of undiscovered shipwrecks is not comprehensive because not all historic sources indicated the specific locations where ships were lost.

Alternative A:

The working group evaluated the distribution of shipwrecks outside the sanctuary and concluded that there were enough known and potential shipwrecks outside the sanctuary to justify expanding the sanctuary boundary.

Alternative B:

The 808-square-mile area was evaluated because it was NOAA's preferred boundary during the sanctuary's designation process. The area contains 63 known shipwrecks, and relative to the entire study area (Alternative C), excludes 15 known wrecks including: American Union, D.N. Barney, F.T. Barney, H.P. Bridge, Cuyahoga, Detroit, Duncan City, Joseph S. Fay, W.C. Franz, John Jewett, Henry J. Johnson, W.G. Mason, Messenger, Monrovia, New York, and Northwestern. Approximately 64 undiscovered shipwrecks may be located in Alternative B, but limiting the sanctuary to the 808-square-mile area reduces the likelihood of inclusion of undiscovered shipwrecks. The working group rejected this alternative in favor of Alternative C because this alternative limited inclusion of known and undiscovered shipwrecks in the sanctuary.

Alternative C:

Based on the density of known and undiscovered resources, the historical, archaeological, and recreational significance of individual and collective resources, the maritime landscape, and the ease of identifying the sanctuary as a three-county area, the working group recommended Alternative C.

Shipwreck Density and Significance

Alternative C contains 78 known and approximately 100 undiscovered shipwrecks. Among them are a number of historically, archaeologically, and recreationally significant shipwrecks not currently included in the sanctuary. Some are mentioned below:

A cluster of shipwrecks, including the *Cornelia B. Windiate*, *Defiance*, *John J. Audubon*, *Florida*, *Norman*, and *Typo* are located just north of the current sanctuary boundary in Presque Isle County. The *Cornelia B. Windiate*, one of the Great Lakes' most intact

shipwrecks, rests in 190 feet of water. This three-mast wooden schooner sank with all hands in December 1875 when bound from Milwaukee to Buffalo with a cargo of wheat. The *Defiance*, a two-mast schooner, is another extremely well-preserved example of midnineteenth century schooner construction. It collided with another schooner, the *Audubon*, in 1854. The *Florida*, a package freighter located in over 200 feet of water, contains a large amount of cargo, including wheat, flour, syrup, and whiskey, most of which remains on the wreck site. The *Norman*, a 296 foot steel bulk freighter, and the *Typo*, a fairly intact three-mast schooner, are also located in that area.

The three-mast wooden barkentine *H.P. Bridge* and the steel bulk freighters *W.C. Franz* and *W.H. Gilbert* lye in Alcona's deeper waters. Artifacts on the virtually intact *H.P. Bridge* include pottery, clothing, and ship tackle and hardware. Deep water wrecks are popular for technical divers who venture beyond the recreational dive limit of 130 feet. These sites are often well preserved, containing many artifacts and providing a wealth of information about the past that is not captured in the historical record.

Access to shipwrecks is not limited to trained scuba divers. Non-divers can snorkel shallow water wrecks, or view them by boat or kayak. These sites offer a tremendous amount of archaeological data on ship architecture and are generally easier to document due to their depth. In Presque Isle, the *Albany*, a paddle-wheel steamboat that sank in 1853, is located in shallow waters just south of the Presque Isle Harbor and the *American Union*, a schooner that sank in 1894, is located near shore at Thompson Harbor. A large section of the starboard side of the wooden bulk freighter *Joseph S. Fay* is located on the beach near 40 Mile Point Lighthouse in Presque Isle County. The rest of the largely intact wreck is located in very shallow water immediately off shore. Other shallow wrecks in the area include the *Duncan City* and *W.G. Mason* in Rogers City, and the *Czar* at Besser Bell.

Many of the known shipwrecks in Alcona County are found in shallow water. Included in this group are the *Marine City* and *City of Alpena*. Twenty lives were lost when the wooden side-wheel steamboat *Marine City* burned off Alcona in 1880. The same year, the wooden harbor tug *City of Alpena* burned off Black River. The tug operated out of Alpena for five years before it burned. Other shallow water wrecks located off Alcona County include the *Mackinaw*, *Buckingham*, *Venus*, and *Detroit*.

The waters off Alpena, Alcona, and Presque Isle Counties contain approximately 100 additional, undiscovered shipwrecks (historic wrecks believed to be lost in this area of Lake Huron). The *Clifton* and *Choctaw* are likely located in Presque Isle County. Both were built in 1892 and represent crafts unique to the Great Lakes. The *Clifton*, a whaleback, was a steel-hulled bulk carrier with a rounded deck and long, snout-like bow resembling the hull of early submarines. Only 41 were constructed. The *Choctaw*, a straight-back, was similar to the *Clifton*, but has more vertical sides and a fuller bow. Locating one or both of these vessels would provide significant historical information of an understudied class of vessels. Likely located in Alcona County are the wooden propellers *R.G. Coburn* and *Egyptian*. The *R.G Coburn* reportedly carried wheat, flour, and valuable silver ore. The *Egyptian* is significant because it was equipped with the first

fore-and-aft compound engine used on the Great Lakes. Expansion of the sanctuary to the entire three county area increases the probability that these undiscovered wrecks will be included in the sanctuary.

The waters east of W83 degrees longitude are some of the deepest areas of Lake Huron. Very little exploration or systematic archaeological survey has occurred in this area due to the depth and remoteness. While current recreational use of these shipwrecks is limited, technical diving technology is becoming more common, resulting in more divers visiting deeper sites. Shipwrecks at these depths are generally better preserved than those in more dynamic, shallow water. Further, deep water shipwrecks have significantly greater numbers of artifacts associated with them. Consequently, the protection of deep water shipwrecks represents the next frontier in maritime heritage preservation. The sanctuary and its partners have the capabilities to survey and document shipwrecks in this area and have before them an unprecedented opportunity to be ahead of the preservation curve. The working group believed that the potential for well preserved wrecks in this area deemed sanctuary protection necessary.

Maritime Landscape

The maritime landscape of Northeast Michigan includes not only the shipwrecks located on Lake Huron bottomlands, but also the channels, docks, piers, and all cultural and natural features related to maritime heritage. Understanding the context of shipwrecks within the broader network of the maritime landscape paints a greater and more complete picture of our collective maritime past. The lighthouses (Presque Isle Lighthouses, 40 Mile Point Lighthouse, and Sturgeon Point Lighthouse) and lifesaving stations (Sturgeon Point and Hammond Bay) of Presque Isle and Alcona Counties offer contexts in which to interpret the area's shipwrecks. Expanding to waters off Presque Isle and Alcona Counties will facilitate relationships with the maritime communities of Rogers City and Harrisville, cities with strong connections to the Great Lakes. The importance of preserving Great Lakes culture is seen throughout these communities in cultural institutions such as the Great Lakes Lore Maritime Museum, the 40 Mile Point Lighthouse Museum, and the maritime museum at Sturgeon Point Lighthouse.

Recommendation

The working group felt it was important and practical for the sanctuary to expand to include Alcona, Alpena, and Presque Isle Counties to the international border to provide protection for those maritime heritage resources currently known and those yet to be discovered. The working group also felt that by expanding sanctuary boundaries to the study area, important national treasures would be protected through the sanctuary's research and monitoring, education, and resource protection (including law enforcement) programs, while allowing recreational use of the resources. On May 22nd, 2007, the boundary expansion working group presented this recommendation to the SAC and the SAC passed a resolution to expand the boundary to the recommended area.
