


ZEBRA MUSSEL MANIA!

Zebra mussels are an invasive species found on many of the shipwrecks in Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary. Zebra mussels do not eat shipwrecks. They attach to them, sometimes up to 5 inches thick. This can damage shipwreck sites and makes it difficult for archaeologists to study them.

- 4 All of the rope and chains used to support and work the sails of a vessel
- 6 A door or opening on a vessel

- 10 The right side of a ship when facing the bow
- 12 The body or shell of a vessel
- 14 Officer in charge of maintaining sails, rigging, anchors, cables, etc. on a vessel
- 16 A window on the outside of a vessel
- 18 The activity of protecting something from loss and danger
- 20 The front section of a vessel
- 21 A craft designed for water transportation
- 22 The main line used as a base on measurement, from which a sites features are measured in an archaeological site plan
- 23 The left side of a ship when facing the bow
- 24 The back section of a vessel

- 1 Machine designed to raise and lower the anchor on a ship
- 3 A portable object(s) that has been modified, shaped, or used by humans
- 5 The primary sail on a sailing ship
- 7 A heavy device attached to a vessel that when thrown overboard, holds the vessel in place
- 9 Large steam ship made for bulk cargoes
- 11 A long, flat piece of timber, part of a deck on a vessel
- 13 A long wooden or metal pole or spar usually vertical on the deck of a vessel that supports sails
- 15 A sailing ship with two or more masts, usually made of wood
- 17 A bladed device that is powered by an engine to move a vessel through the water
- 19 A ship propelled by steam power
- 22 A floating object attached to the lake bottom that marks the location of a shipwreck
